Religious Education

at Bunbury Catholic College

At Bunbury Catholic College education in the Catholic beliefs, values and practices takes place in all aspects of College life.

1. Religious Education: This is a course like any other course that you will study. Therefore, the expectations for students participating in Religious Education classes is the same as for all subject classes – a determination to learn and succeed, positive attitudes and behaviour choices, and respect for everyone who is part of the class.

In Religious Education the focus is on understanding what it means to be you in your community and in your religion. There will be assignments and, at the end of each semester, a grade is awarded.

2. Campus Ministry: This refers to the experiential aspect of Religious Education. Masses, liturgies, prayer events and retreats are organised in each year group or as whole school events. The focus is on spiritual experience. Students are invited to contribute to these events by sharing their talents in events management, in reading, singing, playing music, or in the creative construction of sacred space.

Through participating in **Christian Service** students learn what is meant by the Gospel call to be of service to others. Campus Ministry co-ordinates service learning opportunities that enable the students to respond to the needs of others, and be good stewards of the environment.

3. Finally, Bunbury Catholic students are asked to choose behaviour that is grounded in Catholic values. The College motto, "To act justly, to love tenderly and to walk humbly with your God" (Micah 6:8), clearly asks that we treat all people with dignity and respect.



Pick Up

Pastoral Care

Each Year group in the College has a Pastoral team of staff whose focus is to support students with any pastoral needs they may have. The Pastoral team is there to support the physical and emotional wellbeing of students. For non-academic queries or concerns, these staff members are the best people to contact initially.


Homeroom Teacher

The Homeroom Teacher sees students every morning and is the first staff member they meet. The Homeroom Teacher checks-in with students and helps them prepare and be set up for the rest of the day. Homeroom is an integral part of our Pastoral program, so it is important students are present for it.

In Homeroom students complete a daily prayer, hear important notices and ensure they are organised with what they need for each subject. The Homeroom Teacher also leads the Pastoral Care Period on Wednesday mornings, when students are guided through skills that will support them in high school, such as social and emotional wellbeing programs, personal organisation and goal setting.

Head of Year


The Head of Year is the teaching staff member who oversees the pastoral needs of an entire cohort of students and collaborates with students, parents and staff to meet any pastoral concerns that may arise. The Head of Year works closely with Homeroom Teachers to ensure that each students' unique needs are met and they are, in turn, meeting the expectations of a student at Bunbury Catholic College. Ideally, the Head of Year will be with the same Year group of students from Year 7 right through to graduation.






Frequently Asked Questions

General Administration



I need to contact my child during the school day. Can I send them a text?



All parents are urged not to contact students on their personal mobile phones, make arrangements to leave messages at a certain time, or ask students to call home, at any time during school hours. These actions lead to students having to contravene the ICT Policy, which has real implications for all students. As is standard practice, it is preferable that all communication from and to students, is through the College Administration.



I need to collect my child during school hours. What is the procedure?



When a student is to be collected from school during the school day, a note must be given to the student from a parent or guardian to present to the relevant classroom teacher. The student must meet the parent or guardian at Administration – Student Services. The student must be signed out by a parent or guardian.



Will my child get a Student Card, and what can it be used for?



Student Card showing your child's photograph will be issued and it can be used for accessing College printers, ordering and buying food and drinks at the Cafeteria and at the Uniform Shop.





My child is going to be absent from school. Do I need to let anyone know?



If a student is absent from school, parents must notify the College before 9.30am on the day of the absence. A medical certificate is required if a student is absent for a period of more than three days. On their return to school, students are to provide a written note, signed by their parent, explaining their absence.



Do we need to purchase a computer?

A school computer will be provided to your child early in Term 1 as part of their College fees. Parents will receive an electronic permission form in February that must be signed before the device is issued.

Each Learning Area incorporates the appropriate Microsoft 365 tools into their classes so that student learning is maximised.



Where can I find copies of the policies to be followed by College students?

Copies of the various College Policies (e.g. Choose Peer Respect Policy, Personal Presentation Policy (Uniform), Attendance Policy, Assessment Policy, Alcohol and Drug Policy, ICT Student Use Policy and the Healthy Food and Drink Choices Policy) can be found in the Parent Information section of SETQA and on our College website.











Health and Medical



Does BCC have a nurse on site?



We have a full time College Nurse in the Wellness Centre near Administration. If your child is sick during the school day, they are to visit the nurse who will make contact with home. Students are not to call home themselves please.



Will my child receive any vaccinations at school?



All Year 7 students will be offered participation in the WA school-based immunisation program in 2025. A consent form will be sent to parents and must be returned by the specified date. Please contact the College Nurse on 9721 0000 if you have further questions.



Do I notify the school if there is a change to my child's health status?

A

Please inform the College Nurse if there are any changes in your child's health or wellbeing while they are at Bunbury Catholic College. This includes starting new medication. If your child has asthma, anaphylaxis, allergies or epilepsy, a care plan must be provided to the College.

How can my child access a counsellor at the College?



To request an appointment with a counsellor for the first time, your child can fill out a form at the Wellness Centre or send a direct message to a College Counsellor.



If my child has an EpiPen, what do I need to do?



The EpiPen (x1) will be stored in the Wellness Centre. If the student attends any activity off campus, their action plan and EpiPen will be given to the supervising staff member attending the activity. EpiPens can be taken home at the end of term and returned for the following term.



If my child takes medication prior to commencing the school day and they forget to have it, what can I do?




The College Nurse encourages parents to supply a small amount (no more than three tablets) for such occasions.

Medications are stored in a locked draw and are only accessed by the College Nurse. Parent will need to contact the College prior to the administration of the 'missed' medication, by either phone, email or SEQTA: Direct Message.

Academic



What subjects will my child study in Year 7?



At Bunbury Catholic College, we offer a broad curriculum that challenges and supports students to as they transition into life in secondary school. Students complete all the compulsory subjects — English, Humanities, Languages, Mathematics, Physical Education & Health, and Science — as well as Religious Education.



What languages are offered at Bunbury Catholic College?



We offer Italian and Indonesian as Second Languages. These courses introduce foundational elements for reading, writing, listening and speaking, enabling students to communicate in everyday situations with a particular focus on topics relevant to their age groups and interests. Students will complete a number of assessments: speaking, writing and listening.



What is Education Perfect?

A

Education Perfect is an online learning and assessment tool that will be used extensively as part of the teaching program. It enables students to make use of their computer devices to engage with interactive learning modules, participate in learning at their own pace — both in school and at home, test their knowledge and receive immediate feedback, and participate in class-based and national competitions.





What is SEQTA?



The SEQTA Suite is an all-in-one teaching and learning system enabling teachers, students and parents to work together in an online community. Course programs, assessment outlines and student resources are located in SEQTA.

Communication occurs to and from school via SEQTA Direct Message.

SEQTA Engage enables parents to view their child's timetable, daily notices, academic achievements, teacher feedback and academic reports.

Parents will be provided with their login details at the beginning of Term 1 and are advised to check for communication from teachers and administration every couple of days.



How do I track my child's progress?



Academic reports are made available on SEQTA Engage at the end of Term 1 and at the end of each semester. All Learning Areas report student progress in terms of marks and grades achieved in the content areas of the Western Australian K-10 Curriculum. The semester report tracks academic progress, pastoral development and co-curricular involvement. Students receive an overall course mark and grade in each subject and feedback on their attitude, effort and work habits. Parent Information Evenings are held during Term 1 or Term 2 and Parent-Student-Teacher Interviews are offered at the beginning of Term 2.



Are the Year 7 classes streamed?



English and Mathematics at Bunbury Catholic College are streamed in the second semester of Year 7. This allows teachers to collect a lot of data in the first two terms of the academic year in order to decide the best place for each student commencing in Term 3. We endeavour to meet the needs of each student in their English and Mathematics class, therefore movement can happen at any point in the year following Semester 1.




How can I help my child succeed at BCC?



Organisational skills!

Help your child develop a balance between schoolwork, homework, family time, sport, and social activities. Students are given a copy of the Student Planner — which is a crucial tool to record due dates and school commitments. Tutorials are

held after school from 3:00pm to 4:00pm and students of all ability levels are encouraged to attend. Information about tutorials will be published at the start of each academic year.



Electives



What Year 7 electives are offered at Bunbury Catholic College?



All Year 7 students at Bunbury Catholic College have the opportunity to complete eight electives over the year. Electives are varied, fun, engaging and provide practical, hands on `Taster Courses' from the Arts and Technologies Learning Areas.

Students will be placed into mixed groups and will complete two different **electives** each term.



What are the Arts Learning Area courses in Year 7?



Drama, Dance, Music and Visual Arts.



What are the Technologies Learning Area courses in Year 7?




Food Technology, Metal Design, Wood Design and Robotics.



Do I get changed for Dance?



Yes, you need to wear your Physical Education uniform so you can move comfortably. You will change from your school uniform in the PE change rooms. You may not come to school in your PE uniform if you have Dance in period 1 of that day but may go home in PE uniform if you have Dance in period 6.



Academic Support



My child has been receiving extra literacy support in primary school and I would like it to continue in Year 7, instead of learning a Language.

Is this a possibility?



The literacy level of all in-coming students will be assessed by the English department during Term 1. If your child is identified as requiring additional literacy support, they may be offered a place in an English Acceleration program, focusing on the development of functional literacy, to help them catch up on lagging skills. If your child has a diagnosed learning disability or difficulty, subject to assessment of their literacy level, they may be eligible to participate in a dedicated Literacy Support group.



What if my child has a diagnosed learning disability? Who do I see to discuss this?

A

During the enrolment process, we request information about any learning support needs or diagnosis that could impact your child's learning, communication, socialisation, behaviour or educational achievements. Additionally, our staff gathers information during transition visits to primary schools before Year 7 students start at the College.

If your child receives a new or updated diagnosis, please provide the updated information to the College. The Learning Support Coordinator will then contact you.





College Cafeteria



Does the College Cafeteria need volunteers?



Yes! With your assistance, we are able to serve students promptly and provide them with fresh healthy food at a reasonable price. Volunteering in the café provides you with the opportunity to meet other parents and see the variety of food offered on the café menu. As a volunteer, you will receive morning tea and lunch in a relaxed and friendly environment.

How do lunch orders work?



The easiest way to place a lunch order is via the Bunbury Catholic College website, using the 'Shop' button. Online orders are open for Recess and Lunch and give students a dedicated fast track queue for pick up.

Lunch orders can also be placed by students before Homeroom or during Recess, using a paper bag order form available from the 'Lunch Orders' table in the Cafeteria.

Where can I find a menu for the Cafeteria?



Go to the College website **www.bunburycatholic.wa.edu.au** and look under Parent Essentials. The menu is updated on a seasonal basis and can cater for specific dietary requirements — an allergy alert matrix is available upon request.



How can my child pay for their lunch?



Until students receive their College Student ID Card, they will need to use cash or card to pay for their purchases. Students will receive their Student ID Cards early in Term 1 — these can be pre-paid online and used for 'tap and pay' service at the Cafeteria.

Secondary Assistance Scheme

Applications close on **April 11 2025**.


